August in South Africa is historically devoted to celebrating the successes of women and is a tribute to the more than 20 000 women who marched to the Union Buildings on 9 August 1956 in protest against the extension of Pass Laws to women. This show of support as a call for gender equality and women rights still rings true today. The effects of the COVID-19 pandemic have been highly asymmetric between low-income and more affluent economies. At the same time, evidence unfolds that within the academia, women scientists and scholars have felt the impact of lockdowns more so in their line of work. In this webinar, we seek to explore an alternative direction of this causal relationship: the great role that women scientists play in combating COVID-19 in their various fields and the need for greater women leadership and participation in decision making now more than ever.

The panellists, after presenting their role(s) in the 'fight' against COVID-19, will deal with the following questions:

- Whether women's participation has been sufficient in the search for solutions to controlling the spread of COVID-19, developing a vaccine and others? Why not?
- Are there differences among countries and scientific fields and what lessons can be shared for improvement?
- What can be done to unlock the potential of women within the African continent, within the scientific community and the society in general to assist in the post-COVID-19 recovery?
